

All new members were vetted by the Committee, but in July 1933, a Mr. Portsmouth was rejected, but the reason was not recorded.

It would appear that Messrs Palmer and Elms were in dispute, but the details are not recorded. Mr. Elms said that unless he received an apology from Mr. Palmer he would resign as match secretary. Mr. Palmer was allowed to address the Committee, while Mr. Elms left the meeting. There is no record of the discussion. It was decided after much discussion 'to the best interest of the club to let the matter end' Mr. Elms continued as match secretary. Mr. Palmer handed a letter to the secretary, which was read to the Committee. (Again there are no details of the contents).

It was agreed that Mr. F. Heywood should collect for Mr Gregory. There is no indication why. The Mr. Gregory I knew was alive in the late 1950s. He lived at 4 Petersham Ave.

It was reported at the November Committee Meeting that Mrs Faulkener sent a parcel to be given to "the hardest working member of the club". The secretary was asked to receive the pullover.

At the AGM of 1933, it was decided that 'rule 5 be rescinded', but rule 4 should remain. (I wish I knew what the rules were!) It was proposed that members enter the 'Surrey Links' competition themselves, and that they should also pay the entrance fees. It was also proposed 'that no entry be made for the Surrey Herald Cup'. The decisions on these two proposals are not recorded.

In 1934 there was a vote on subscriptions. The proposal to raise it to 5/- was rejected, and the sum remained at 2/6d.

The secretary was asked to send a letter of thanks to the Council for the enlargement of the bowling green. Mr. Holroyd resigned as President, and Mr. Bruzard was elected. It was decided that Vice presidents that had given no donation should be struck off, and the remaining Vice Presidents be elected en block.

The Committee decided that the club tie was the same as Vickers Armstrong, and after discussion it was agreed to adopt the 'setting given by Mr Howell as the same as the London Rifle Brigade'. (In 1934).

In 1935 the Club was invited to enter the Weybridge Hospital Cup. Owing to the many other competitions, the News Chronicle competition was 'laid on the table'. It was decided that there should be a club competition on Jubilee Day (May 6 1935). Two of the finalists in the Stevens Shield (a pairs competition) had withdrawn. It was agreed to follow the rules of the EBA and SCBA; those who had withdrawn were unable to receive any prize. A move to refer the matter to SCBA was lost.

In 1936 the AGM agreed that The secretary, Captain and Vice-Captain should have the power to elect new Members to the club.

Mr. G. Carpenter left four woods in his will 'for the sole use of the members of Byfleet Bowling Club'. It was decided that the woods be kept in the secretary's locker ' who would kindly lend them to any member who wish to use them.
